



Major Gift Strengthers Future of FAMILY MEDICINE

OUTSTANDING INSTITUTIONAL LEADER. MASTER CLINICIAN. TRUSTED COLLEAGUE.

Now, Dr. Mary Hall has added "philanthropist" to her list of accolades, following a major gift that she and her husband, Dr. David Hall, made in support of family medicine at Atrium Health. Hall retired in June 2024 after 37 years of distinguished service including as Atrium Health's senior vice president of

medical education and chief academic officer.



Longtime champions of education and family medicine, the couple established the Dr. Mary and Dr. David Hall Family Medicine Fund in hopes of inspiring others to invest in this critical area of medicine. The fund will provide the chair of the department of family medicine in Charlotte with annual discretionary funding to advance faculty development and enrichment activities in the areas of education, clinical and research skills, and programming.

"It is our hope that this contribution will enrich the faculty and enable them to thrive in their roles," said Dr. Mary Hall. "The family physicians,

researchers, and other health care professionals come to work every day driven by their mission to care for patients, explore scientific discovery, and educate the next generation of family physicians."

"We practice family medicine because we love it," said Dr. Rebecca Hayes, interim chair of Atrium Health's department of family medicine in Charlotte. "It's not lucrative," she added, explaining that if faculty don't feel supported or have the resources to advance their careers, they are more reluctant to

choose that path. "Mary has been a pioneer in our specialty, and the fact that she specifically earmarked faculty development in this gift, truly helps morale."

"Mary is wise," said Dr. David Slawson, immediate past chair of Atrium Health's department of family medicine, who Hall recruited to help prepare the department to integrate with the Wake Forest University School of Medicine. "She knows that to attract and retain the highest-quality family physicians, we have to have the funds to support their academic careers."

Slawson spent decades at UVA Health, where — as an endowed chair — he published, traveled internationally, and consulted for government health care systems around the world, bringing prestige to the university. When he arrived at Atrium Health, Slawson discovered a "brilliant" faculty but a lack of funding for advancing educational opportunities similar to those at UVA.

"We're not cancer or heart or on the forefront of the news, so we're not always on the docket for philanthropy," said Dr. Dellyse Bright, vice chair of education at Atrium Health in Charlotte and former head of the residency program under Hall's mentorship. "We love to do things for residents but lacked funding for activities like team building, appreciation events, and national conferences. Thanks to the new fund, we will now have that support."

Supporting and developing faculty has a significant impact, according to Hall. "Faculty educate residents and students while caring for their own patients. By preparing learners to become family physicians, they influence future patient care through their graduates."

"I'm a better doctor because I'm a teacher of doctors," said Bright, who credits Mary as an amazing mentor. In addition to her exemplary faculty mentorship, Dr. Hall has been a passionate national advocate for strengthening doctor-patient relationships to uplift health and the overall well-being of patients and their physicians.

"Family Medicine's foundation is comprehensive, longterm primary care," said Dr. Hall, "which builds understanding and trust between doctor, patient, and family. Moreover, family physicians are essential in guiding patients through the increasingly complex medical landscape."

Dr. Hall, who continues her work as a senior advisor to the dean and professor emeritus at Wake Forest University School of Medicine, is committed to addressing the shortage of family physicians in the U.S. and providing funding to advance academic careers.

"People don't realize what a bigwig Mary is because she doesn't desire a lot of flash," said Dr. Michelle Birch, associate dean of pre-clerkship and education at Wake Forest School of Medicine-Charlotte. "She's been a gift to the field, nationally and internationally; and now, locally, family medicine physicians will feel valued. This donation reflects her generosity of heart."



PHILANTHROPY FUELING NEUROSCIENCES IN GREATER CHARLOTTE


very day across Advocate Health — of which Atrium Health is a part — more than 600 physicians and advanced care providers are using emerging treatments, diagnostic tools, and innovations to bring hope and promise to patients who require cognitive care. Locally, that means patients will benefit from collaborations with Wake Forest University School of Medicine, for example, which is known for its world class research in Alzheimer's Disease. Along with her team, Dr. Donna Graves, chair and specialty medical director of neurology in Greater Charlotte, is leveraging these partnerships to establish the first Comprehensive Cognitive Care Program in Greater Charlotte. "I'm deeply grateful to our donors and community partners who have helped us expedite the planning process as we prepare to launch the program this year," said Dr. Graves.

Grateful Patient Family Establishes Endowed Chair in Cognitive Health

Family members of Dotti Shelton and Charles Shelton have turned their experience with Alzheimer's and dementia into an opportunity to impact cognitive care for decades to come. Their transformational gift, honoring the memory of Dotti Shelton and Charles Shelton, recently established the Shelton Endowed Chair for Cognitive Health Fund. The fund will support innovative research, educational opportunities, and other special projects to advance Alzheimer's and dementia-related treatments and clinical care, leading to novel developments in this field.

"We learned firsthand how an early and accurate diagnosis can impact the course of Alzheimer's care," said Mandy [Shelton] Houser, whose late father and aunt were impacted by the disease. "We want to help open the door for other families and enable options for diagnosis, risk reduction, treatment, and support."

The fund will also support an endowed chair to oversee the Comprehensive Cognitive Care Program in Greater Charlotte. A national search is currently underway for the chairholder, who will help implement GUIDE — a new cognitive care model that is based on a wrap-around, team-based approach to supporting people living with dementia, as well as their caregivers. The model is intended to help improve access and focuses on comprehensive assessments, education, and respite for caregivers, and coordination of community-based services. Continued on pg. 6

Unique Partnership to Address Memory Care in Rural Counties

A generous gift from local businessman Dennis Moser will help launch a memory care ministry in Union and Anson counties. Moser established the **Dennis W. Moser Memory Care Fund** to support patients and caregivers managing memory care and dementia-related illnesses.

In partnership with the Alzheimer's Association, Council on Aging in Union County, and Wingate University, this new ministry will provide a six-week support program for caregivers of patients experiencing Alzheimer's and other dementia-related issues. Piloted in Union and Anson counties, the program will be facilitated through churches and the faith-community network.

Additionally, this gift will expand innovative programs across Atrium Health facilities in Union and Anson counties, including an upfitted sensory room in the Jesse Helms

Nursing Center at Atrium Health Union; doll therapy equipment; and technology to promote cognitive stimulation and skills for patients suffering from memory loss.

Neurological conditions are the world's leading cause of disability-adjusted life years, and result in over 90 million deaths annually. Fortunately, we are witnessing an explosion of increasingly effective therapies, thanks to molecular medicine, robotics, neuro-pharmacology, and computer science.

Lead Gift to Launch New Era in Neurosciences In Charlotte

Local business leader and co-chair of Atrium Health's Giving

Hope campaign, Tom Finke, and his wife, Heather, are ramping up local cognitive care through a lead gift to Atrium Health Foundation. Their commitment will help launch an endowed chair at the Atrium Health Neurosciences Institute, supporting extensive research that has significant potential to improve societal health and well-being.

"The Neurosciences Institute is one of the best kept secrets in Charlotte, and it's time to share that secret — loudly," said the Finkes.

Dr. Anthony "Tony" A. Asher, leader of the Neurosciences Institute in Charlotte, believes Atrium Health is uniquely positioned to address brain health with the same strategies and resources that have been used to advance cardiac care and cancer.

"As part of a health care system with a world-class academic core, we are obligated to learn about human health and disease and use that knowledge to improve well-being and reduce disease burden to the greatest extent, and on the broadest scale possible," said Dr. Asher.

"Strong leaders are essential to the long-range goals associated with this program," said the Finkes. "We look forward to the celebration of accomplishments, research findings, and new facilities that may be associated with growth and future philanthropic commitments."

High School to Hospital:

ADRIANNA'S PATH TO BECOMING AN ATRIUM HEALTH TEAMMATE

From a young age, Adrianna Bird knew she wanted to pursue a career in health care, driven by a passion for helping others and a natural curiosity about medicine. But it was her time at Hawthorne Academy of Health Sciences — a health care-focused high school located in Charlotte — that set the foundation for her journey. Adrianna is a graduate of Hawthorne Academy, which received a \$26.3 million investment from Bloomberg Philanthropies in 2024. The school's early-college program, developed in partnership with Atrium Health, Carolinas College of Health Sciences, and Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools, provides high school students with specialized courses and hands-on experiences like internships and certifications in health care. Adrianna took advantage of Atrium Health's Propelling Adolescents Towards Careers in Health Care (PATCH) program and the Mayor's Youth Employment Program, securing several summer internships at Atrium Health. These opportunities allowed her to shadow health care professionals, explore different specialties, and build a network of mentors and peers who shared her aspirations.

Today, Adrianna is balancing her education with work as a patient safety attendant at Atrium Health Levine Children's Hospital, where she plays a key role in ensuring the safety of her young patients. She is working toward earning her Associate of Applied Science in Cardiovascular Technology. Her ultimate career goal is to become an OB/GYN. "A lot of

moms pass away during birth, and I want to help with that." Her commitment to improving maternal health care is driven by a desire to address health gaps and make a meaningful difference for her patients.

Adrianna's journey illustrates the importance of early exposure and hands-on experience in shaping a meaningful career. "A lot of teenagers want to work in health care, but they don't know where to start, or they don't know much about the careers and pathways to go on," she said.

"Hawthorne Academy allowed me to get those opportunities and meet a lot of great people. I really loved the team and the culture at Atrium Health, and I'm excited to officially be a part of the family now."

Friends of NASCAR Support Children's Health



A \$100,000 grant from Speedway Children's Charities will strengthen the Human Trafficking Advocacy Team at Atrium Health. Funding will help build a digitally integrated safety net for identifying and responding to human trafficking cases. Led by Dr. Stacy Reynolds, an emergency medicine physician at Atrium Health Carolinas Medical Center, the team offers rapid identification, compassionate intervention, and continued support for victims.

The multi-disciplinary team includes physicians, advanced practice providers, social workers, advocates, and a data analysis group, all working together to deliver trauma-informed care. Atrium Health uses innovative technology, including a tracking alert system in electronic medical records, to recognize trafficking cases early and improve patient outcomes.

With Speedway Children's Charities' generous support, Atrium Health will continue to reduce vulnerabilities, offer comprehensive care, and protect children from exploitation.

RODGERS BUILDERS AND ATRIUM HEALTH: BUILDING HOPE FOR A HEALTHY TOMORROW

For nearly 40 years, Rodgers Builders has been a vital partner of Atrium Health, helping to transform the physical footprint of the health system across the greater Charlotte area. Leading this effort is Pat Rodgers, former CEO, who currently serves as Cabinet Co-Chair of the Giving Hope Campaign — the Foundation's largest comprehensive philanthropic campaign to-date.

Recently, Rodgers Builders committed a transformational gift, half of which is designated to support several of Atrium Health Foundation's signature fundraisers benefiting Atrium Health Levine Children's, Atrium Health Levine Cancer, and Atrium Health Pineville. The remainder of the gift will help to advance construction of a state-of-the-art advanced care facility underway at the flagship campus, Atrium Health Carolinas Medical Center. The 12-story patient bed tower is slated to open in 2027 and will include a 4th-floor staff lounge named for Rodgers Builders.

Last December, Rodgers Builders, along with Atrium Health leaders, construction project managers, and design teams, gathered to celebrate the 'topping out' of the new advanced care facility — a significant milestone in the construction of the 1.1 million-square-foot expansion at Atrium Health's main campus.

"The Bed Tower project is an amazing endeavor based on its size, scale, and complexity," said John DeLony, Rodgers Builders' vice president of construction operations. 'When completed, it will significantly enhance Atrium Health's ability to provide health, hope, and healing for the greater Charlotte community."

With philanthropic support and dedicated partners like Rodgers Builders, Atrium Health Carolinas Medical Center is poised to provide the highest level of care for the region. This important investment in Atrium Health's future will modernize the health system's flagship campus to accommodate more medical innovations and patient-centered health care services than ever before.

IN MEMORIAM

Bishop George Edward BATTLE JR.

May 14, 1947 - March 9, 2025

The Atrium Health family celebrates the life and extraordinary legacy of Bishop George E. Battle, Jr.—a man who was a leader, mentor, friend to many, and true pillar of our community.

George Edward Battle, Jr. was born May 14, 1947, in Edgecombe County, North Carolina. He graduated from Clinton Jr. College in 1967 and earned his B.A. from Livingstone College in 1969. He later earned the M.Div. degree from Hood Theological Seminary in 1972 and received his Doctor of Ministry degree from the Howard University School of Divinity in 1990.

While words can never fully capture the depth of his impact, Bishop Battle was a leader whose unwavering dedication to access, education, and opportunity changed countless lives. As an emeritus member of the Atrium Health Board of Commissioners and the Atrium Health Foundation Board, Bishop Battle played a pivotal role in shaping Atrium Health into what it is today. His efforts extended far

beyond our walls, enriching communities through his advocacy for affordable housing, small businesses, and more. Bishop Battle also generously gave for many years to Atrium Health Levine Children's Hospital, exemplifying his passion for children and the next generation.

In 1975, Bishop Battle founded the Greater Enrichment Program which now operates in several Charlotte-Mecklenburg schools. Its mission is to provide an out-of-school educational program for school-age students and their parents, regardless of their background and abilities, helping children realize their potential for academic achievement, cultural/social enrichment, positive self-esteem, and productive citizenship.


Bishop Battle served for 17 years as a member of the Charlotte Mecklenburg Board of Education, including four years as its chairman. A lifelong advocate for the economically disadvantaged, he received more than 100 awards and honors during his career, including the Long



Leaf Pine Award, the highest award bestowed by the state of North Carolina. His steadfast commitment to uplifting the underserved, and his record of successfully delivering on that work, has left an indelible mark on Charlotte and beyond.

Atrium Health proudly established the Bishop George E. Battle Jr. Scholarship Fund, dedicated to ensuring educational opportunities and careers in health care are accessible for all. This fund reflects Bishop Battle's lifelong mission to create pathways for others, while addressing the growing shortage of clinicians in both urban and rural communities across the Carolinas.

Bishop Battle's life was an anthem to servant leadership. He led with compassion, conviction, and an unwavering belief in the power of community. While the loss is profound, his influence will be felt for years to come, and his legacy will continue to inspire us all to lead with purpose and heart.

A Texas native who was raised in Huntsville, Alabama, Dias pursued his undergraduate studies at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, followed by medical school at the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine. His path into executive medicine began during residency at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, where he cared for high-visibility patients, including senior-ranking military personnel and former presidential candidates. "It was my first exposure to this side of health care, and I enjoyed it," said Dias.

His journey with executive medicine continued at Fort Bragg, N.C., where he led a clinic caring for 36 military generals in the 82nd Airborne. The experience instilled in him a deep respect for the unique needs of high-performing individuals and the importance of time-sensitive, customized care. "They are a special group that often chooses to prioritize their careers over personal well-being," said Dias, "so I work with them to form an alliance to achieve overall health through proactive and preventive care, such as stress management, nutrition, exercise, and weight management."

Dias believes that early intervention and a personalized approach can significantly improve the quality of life for his patients. Not only do they value their consolidated care schedules and efficient coordination of multiple appointments and tests, but they have embraced his mantra of investing in their wellness.

Many of Dias's patients, out of gratitude for their care, also invest back in the health of others through contributions to concierge medicine or other specialties they have utilized. "By connecting our grateful patients with Atrium Health Foundation, we are helping additional patients achieve positive outcomes, which can have a broad ripple effect across Atrium Health," said Dias.

"The earlier you make health a priority, the greater the return," emphasized Dias, who, outside of work, volunteers with a local veterans' charity and enjoys spending time with his three children. He coaches them all with the same advice he gives patients: invest in your health!

The Leon Levine Foundation puts students' mental health first

hildren living in rural counties will now have greater access to mental health care through a recent grant of \$2.08 million from The Leon Levine Foundation to expand Atrium Health's School-Based Therapy Program. This transformational gift will benefit K-12 students in five rural counties in North Carolina.

With support from The Leon Levine Foundation, Atrium Health's School-Based Therapy Program, which has predominately served students in Title I schools who come from lower income families, will expand to address unique barriers to mental health care experienced by residents in more rural communities. This critical development within the program reflects Atrium Health's deep commitment to all patients and families in our service area.

"For over 27 years, I have been a part of Atrium Health's School Based Therapy Program, and I have seen firsthand the impact of providing high quality care in schools for the students and the communities we serve," shared Donnie Mitchem, director of outpatient therapy for Atrium Health Behavioral Health Charlotte. "We are so grateful for organizations like The Leon Levine Foundation for recognizing the need and helping us help others."

Compared to urban areas, rural communities face challenges of having fewer options for both primary and mental health care services, which is compounded by negative stigmas associated with mental illness and a general lack of behavioral health support resources. Atrium Health's School-Based Therapy Program aims to fill these critical gaps in mental health care and community education.

As North Carolina continues to rank well above the national average for prevalence of mental health illness and ranks 26th for access to care nationwide, support from The Leon Levine Foundation is helping to rewrite our state's history, starting with communities in greatest need. As the School-Based Therapy Program expands, students and their families will have access to virtual and in-person therapy services and educational sessions, emphasizing:

Early detection and treatment: Swiftly addressing children's mental health concerns helps prevent escalation and promotes overall well-being. Students will be offered an appointment within 10 days or less from their initial request.

Reduced mental health stigma: Creating a secure, nonjudgmental, and supportive environment, naturally fostering trust.

Decreased time away from school: Eliminating the need for children and parents to travel for therapy appointments.

Improved academic performance: Spending less time away from class and developing coping skills often leads to improved learning readiness.


Currently providing care in two states, 11 counties, and more than 206 schools, Atrium Health's School-Based Therapy Program works with local school systems and is powered by 33+ licensed therapists who offer more than 8,500 in-person and 12,000 virtual therapy sessions each year. Thanks to The Leon Levine Foundation's generosity, these numbers will continue to climb.

Thanks to the Gross Foundation's generosity, Dr. Bei Hu, associate professor of medicine in hematologic oncology and blood disorders, is participating in two national multi-center retrospective reviews to better understand and impact care outcomes and treatment side effects for lymphoma patients.

The first study is currently examining side effects of Mogamulizumab for patients with cutaneous T-cell lymphoma, a rare type of skin cancer. The second study is focused on Minimal Residual Disease, the presence of cancer cells that remain in the body after treatment of blood cancers. This specific study addresses patients diagnosed with Diffuse Large B-cell Lymphoma, with the hope of better predicting relapse of the disease.

Catalysts for Cardiovascular Care Transformation

Led by Dr. Bill Downey, the Jenny & Jeff Gross Family Center for Cardiovascular Care Transformation at Sanger Heart & Vascular Institute focuses on medical innovation in cardiovascular care education, clinical research, and care pathways using the latest technology and multidisciplinary expertise to address significant cardiovascular issues.

With support from the William, Jeff and Jennifer Gross Foundation, Sanger Heart & Vascular Institute is connecting clinical data across Advocate Health care centers in the Midwestern and Southeastern U.S. through a cardiovascular enterprise data platform developed by Advocate Health, of which Atrium Health is a part. The breadth of data analytics shared across the two regions allows Sanger Heart & Vascular Institute to improve clinical decision-making, advance research, and achieve continuous quality improvement.

"The Gross family's continued generosity catalyzes our work to innovate and thereby provide the highest quality cardiovascular care to all in the communities we serve," said Dr. Bill Downey, vice chair of quality care and transformation at Sanger Heart & Vascular Institute and the first named chairholder of The Gross Family Endowed Chair in Cardiovascular Medicine.

Sanger Heart & Vascular Institute is leading a new project aimed at reducing complications, shortening hospital stays, and improving patient outcomes through optimized pre- and postsurgical care.

Sanger Heart & Vascular Institute is using the data to pinpoint where disparities exist along a patient's care journey and transform care operations accordingly.

Big Boost

24 FOUNDATION STEPS UP FOR SUPPORTIVE ONCOLOGY

Adult and pediatric cancer patients will have access to enhanced survivorship and wellness programs at Atrium Health, thanks to a \$2 million gift from 24 Foundation. The gift will help expand the supportive oncology programs at Atrium Health's Levine Cancer Institute and Levine Children's Hospital in Charlotte, which provide personalized resources to patients and their caregivers throughout their cancer journey.

In a partnership that has spanned the past 20 years, 24 Foundation has collectively invested more than \$7 million in Atrium Health to improve the quality of life for those impacted by cancer. And since its inception in 2002, the organization has raised over \$29 million to support cancer navigation and survivorship programs through local and national beneficiaries.



"We are deeply grateful for our longstanding partnership with 24 Foundation and their continued dedication to our cancer patients and their care teams," said Dr. Ruben Mesa, president of Atrium Health Levine Cancer. "Their transformational philanthropic investments continue to propel us to the forefront of supportive oncology, fueling crucial services that ensure our patients thrive throughout their treatment."

A significant portion of the 24 Foundation gift will provide continued funding for Levine Cancer Institute's art and music therapy; yoga and tai chi; and massage and acupuncture. The gift will also support the cancer resource center, psycho-oncology and exercise physiology programs, virtual programming, and a new full-time dietitian to work

individually with oncology patients to develop personal nutrition plans.

At Atrium Health Levine Children's, 24 Foundation will continue to support a psychology fellow — who provided mental health care for 310 patients in 2024 — and supplies for the 24 Foundation healthy snack cart, which teaches patient and families the importance of nutrition during cancer treatment. Funds will also launch a prehabilitation program to strengthen patients, physically and mentally, prior to treatment, and support team-building opportunities for pediatric and young adult cancer survivors.

"Thanks to partners like 24 Foundation, we are offering a full range of services to our survivorship patients," said Dr. Jen Pope, director of supportive medicine at Atrium Health Levine Children's Cancer & Blood Disorders Center, whose department cared for over 700 patients in the last year. "Teamwork between health care professionals and the community ensures that our patients don't just achieve a cure but thrive through survivorship."

"We are deeply committed to our partnership with Atrium Health and ensuring that patients in our community have equal access to the highest quality cancer services available," said Katherine Murphy, executive director of 24 Foundation. The Duke Endowment Lays Groundwork for Pathways to Health, Pipelines to Medical Careers

The Duke Endowment recently granted Atrium Health Foundation over \$1.93 million to support health care providers, expand initiatives to address community health, and enhance health care workforce resilience and educational opportunities through three innovative programs. Including its longstanding support of Atrium Health's mission, The Duke Endowment's 100-year history is marked by transformational support of child and family well-being, health care, higher education, and rural faith communities — a testament to the organization's commitment to improving the lives of families, patients, and caregivers throughout the Carolinas.

Pathways to healthy communities

Healthy People, Healthy Carolinas (HPHC) is a community health initiative launched by The Duke Endowment to promote behavioral changes and address chronic health issues in 20 communities in North and South Carolina. Their latest grant will support Atrium Health's collaboration with Impact York County. "HPHC builds community partnerships," said Shekinah Miller, program and project coordinator for Impact York County.

"Atrium Health supports these partners by helping with evidence-based interventions, improving food access, and community education for vulnerable populations."

Additionally, grant funding from The Duke Endowment will support Physicians Reach Out (PRO) through a partnership with Atrium Health and Care Ring. PRO extends a community network of care for low-income, uninsured patients in Mecklenburg County. The program links patients to a local network of doctors, specialists, dentists, laboratories, and hospitals that supports primary, surgical, orthopedic, and cancer care at little or no cost to qualifying patients.

New pipelines to foster, retain health care workforce

Designed to provide mentorship and exposure to health care careers, Atrium Health's HYPE (Hope for Youth Providing Education) Academy recently received a boost from The Duke Endowment to better serve local high school students and address gaps in the regional and local health care workforce. "HYPE Summer Academy is more than just a program — it's a gateway to opportunity," said Patricia Beckas, a senior human resources consultant with Atrium Health. "By connecting rural high school students with hands-on experiences, mentorship, and career exploration in health care, we're not just shaping futures — we're strengthening communities and the workforce of tomorrow."





Complementing the HYPE Summer Academy, Atrium Health is partnering with CaraNova, an incubator and health transformation catalyst, to jointly power a Health System Workforce Experience Accelerator. With support from The Duke Endowment, the program will address challenges in retaining a robust health care workforce by compiling and sharing best practices and innovations that improve resiliency and reduce employee burnout.

Funding from The Duke Endowment will also enable Atrium Health to offer PRISM — an evidence-based neurofeedback therapy — to treat post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). The first self-neuromodulation device cleared by the FDA to treat PTSD, Prism is helping health care workers regulate symptoms in an engaging and personalized experience. Dr. Oleg V. Tcheremissine, clinical professor and research director at Wake Forest University School of Medicine-Charlotte, will oversee PRISM. "PTSD is a significant concern among health care workers, especially those who have been on the frontlines during crises. Expanding access to effective treatments for our workforce remains a top priority for Advocate Health," said Dr. Tcheremissine.

RESEARCH

CVS Health to Expand School-Based Virtual Care

A \$179,000 grant from CVS Health will support the expansion of Atrium Health Levine Children's School-Based Virtual Care program in Rutherford County. Funding will extend the program, which already operates in the county's elementary and high schools, to its three middle schools, allowing students and staff to access care, including diagnoses, treatment, and prescriptions—without ever having to leave school.

School-based telemedicine connects students to health care providers through virtual video visits. Physicians use advanced technology to diagnose and treat health concerns remotely, with parents joining either in-person or virtually. This program offers caregivers convenient health care without missing work or transporting children to a doctor's office.

With over 7,000 students in Rutherford County Schools — including 10 elementary schools, three middle schools, and three high schools — the program is expected to complete over 1,300 virtual visits annually, supporting students with both acute and chronic health issues, and ultimately contributing to their academic success.

EPIC Launches School-Based Therapy in Two Rural Counties



Atrium Health's School-Based Therapy program has received a \$100,000 grant from EPIC Systems to launch teletherapy services in Montgomery County Schools and Asheboro City Schools. The expansion will bring much-needed mental health support to students in two rural counties, where access to care has traditionally been limited.

Offered through a partnership between Atrium Health Behavioral Health Services and Atrium Health Levine Children's School-Based Virtual Care, the program will serve over 8,000 middle and high school students, providing an accessible and convenient way for adolescents to receive mental health support.

Paula Takacs Foundation: Revolutionizing Sarcoma Detection

The Paula Takacs Foundation for Sarcoma Research is advancing the fight against sarcoma and other rare cancers with its largest donation to date to support patients at Atrium Health. Their \$310,000 contribution brings the foundation's total

funding to \$2.4 million, directly benefiting sarcoma research and clinical trials at Atrium Health Levine Cancer Institute and Atrium Health Levine Children's in Charlotte.

The Paula Takacs Foundation's generous support has helped position Atrium Health as a leader in clinical research, funding numerous studies aimed at increasing survival rates, improving quality of life, and expanding treatment options for sarcoma patients.


One of the key studies currently funded by the Paula Takacs Foundation focuses on solving a major challenge in sarcoma care: the lack of reliable diagnostic tools. Currently, there aren't effective blood tests or markers to guide treatment of sarcoma. To address this issue, Dr. Johann Hsu and his colleagues at Atrium Health Levine Cancer are investigating the use of a type of blood test called a liquid biopsy, which could help detect sarcoma earlier and track its progression.

Liquid biopsies work by detecting tiny bits of circulating tumor DNA (ctDNA) in the blood. While liquid biopsies have already proven successful for cancers like lung, breast, and colon cancer, their use in sarcoma is still preliminary. Dr. Hsu's team is testing a broad range of sarcomas, with a particular focus on

types that often exhibit genetic alterations — such as osteosarcoma, liposarcoma, and leiomyosarcoma.

In a small pilot study, the research team analyzed blood and tumor samples from 13 cancer patients, as well as healthy control samples. They found that ctDNA was present in 73% of the cancer samples, and in 69% of the sarcoma samples. Most importantly, the genetic changes in the blood closely matched those found in the tumor tissue, suggesting that liquid biopsies could be a reliable way to track the disease.





Although the study showed encouraging results, it also uncovered limitations. For example, some types of sarcoma, like synovial sarcoma, release less tumor DNA into the bloodstream, making it harder to detect with liquid biopsies. Regardless, Dr. Hsu and his team are hopeful about the future of liquid biopsies in sarcoma care and plan to conduct a larger study to see if liquid biopsies can help detect cancer recurrence and personalize treatment for each patient.

Through its partnership with the Paula Takacs Foundation, Atrium Health will continue advancing this innovative research, bringing renewed hope to patients and their families.







s the landscape of cancer therapeutics has evolved rapidly over the past two decades, philanthropic investments have allowed clinicians to move boldly toward more innovative and interdisciplinary approaches to care and treatment. In recent years, the hybrid discipline of cardio-oncology has emerged as an essential subspecialty dedicated to minimizing cardiotoxicity — heart damage caused by cancer treatment — and improving cancer outcomes for patients with cardiovascular disease.

In 2022, the Charlotte-based Dowd Foundation stepped forward with a transformational gift, establishing The Dowd Foundation Center of Cardio-Oncology in memory of Janis Dowd. As part of that commitment, The Dowd Foundation recently supported a groundbreaking pilot study, the CAPACITY (Cardiac Amyloid and Physician ACTivity) Trial, enrolling 50 patients to help researchers learn how cardiac rehabilitation can improve outcomes for cardiac amyloidosis.

The Dowd Foundation Center for Cardio-Oncology is also incorporating advanced cardiac imaging for the early detection of cardiotoxicity, allowing clinicians to adjust patients' cancer treatment and help prevent heart damage and preserve heart function. This work involves Atrium Health Sanger Heart & Vascular Institute's participation in a national MRI registry for amyloidosis — a multicenter collaboration on how best to screen for and diagnose cardiac amyloidosis. Initial results of the initiative were recently published in the European Heart Journal for Cardiovascular Imaging.

Emphasizing a multidisciplinary approach to care, and with support from The Dowd Foundation, the Center has recently begun using specialty nurses to streamline and coordinate care across oncology, pharmacy, imaging, and other disciplines. "Patients are connected to all necessary supportive care with the multidisciplinary team, whether at Sanger Heart & Vascular Institute, Atrium Health Levine Cancer, or other specialty partners," explains cardiologist Dr. Jai Singh, who leads the Center.

"Nurses, as care coordinators, are the bridge that transforms patient concerns into timely care and ensure each patient receives the attention and treatment they deserve," shared Shelby Kotsokalis, nurse program coordinator for Cardio-Oncology. "We have the privilege of supporting and empowering patients to help them feel their best during a very vulnerable time."

An important milestone in Sanger Heart & Vascular Institute's continued rise to national prominence was achieved last October, when Atrium Health hosted the inaugural Dowd Foundation Center for Cardio-Oncology Symposium. The event brought together national experts with clinical leaders from both Sanger Heart & Vascular Institute and Levine Cancer Institute to discuss challenging cases in cardio-oncology. The Dowd Foundation's generosity will continue to fuel new innovations and foster cross-specialty collaboration in this emerging field of medicine for years to come.



GENE-EDITING THERAPY GIVES TEEN WITH SICKLE CELL DISEASE A CHANCE FOR A BRIGHTER FUTURE

Ryan Dodson, 18, was diagnosed with sickle cell disease soon after he was born. Sickle cell disease is a genetic condition that can cause severe pain, organ failure, and decreased life expectancy.

At a young age, Ryan began to experience numerous health challenges, including debilitating pain crises and surgery to remove his spleen. "By the time he got to middle school, he'd missed 100-plus days of school," said Kim, Ryan's mother.

Like many families with a child who has sickle cell disease, the Dodsons frequented the emergency department and numerous doctors' offices.

They found his long-term sickle cell care team at Atrium Health Levine Children's Brenner Children's Hospital in Winston-Salem, N.C. There, he learned about a new gene-editing clinical trial at Atrium Health Levine Children's Hospital in Charlotte — one of only a few sites in the nation offering this curative therapy option.

At Levine Children's Hospital, the clinical trial offered Ryan and his family a path forward, and renewed hope. He underwent a onetime treatment where he donated his stem cells, received high-dose chemotherapy, and then got his gene-edited cells back.

For Ryan, the gene-editing treatment has been a game-changer. He is symptom-free and on the road to recovery.

"Kids and young adults living with sickle cell disease suffer many complications of their disease that impact all aspects of their life, and often those of their loved ones," said Dr. Lyndsay Molinari, pediatric stem cell transplant physician at Levine Children's Hospital. "This important new treatment has been shown to eliminate pain and improve the quality of life for those born with sickle cell disease."

Gene editing uses advanced technology to turn on the production of fetal hemoglobin in the red blood cells of sickle cell disease patients. Once these cells are transplanted back into the body, the patient has the same type of protection they experienced in-utero. A potential benefit of this novel approach is that, unlike other treatments for the disease, patients shouldn't need continual, daily medication following the gene editing treatment.

RECEPTIONS FOR RESEARCH AND DEFIBITECH: **EMPOWERING HEART SAFETY IN SCHOOLS**

Receptions for Research: The Greg Olsen Foundation, and Defibtech, a leading designer and manufacturer of automated external defibrillators (AEDs), recently partnered to equip Atrium Health athletic trainers in Charlotte-Mecklenburg schools with life-saving medical technology. Thanks to a donation of 89 AEDs, local schools can protect the heart health of student athletes and sports fans using the most advanced technology available.


A portable device that detects and treats a potentially fatal heart rhythm, an AED delivers an electric shock to the heart to restore its normal rhythm. Though medical emergencies requiring an AED are uncommon, in 90% of sudden cardiac events, the life-saving device is not readily available.

Jennifer Gardner, assistant vice president of outreach at the Atrium Health Musculoskeletal Institute, helps lead efforts to ensure schools can protect the health and well-being of student-athletes. "Athletic trainers need access to the tools that allow them to perform their job at the highest level possible," said Jennifer. "AEDs save lives, and the athletes, coaches, staff, and spectators are safer when lifethreatening emergencies happen on the sidelines."





Receptions for Research, through its HEARTest Yard initiative, has a long history of support for Atrium Health, including establishing the Atrium Health Levine Children's HEARTest Yard Congenital Heart Center, which opened in 2020 and provides comprehensive care and support to families and children effected by congenital heart conditions.



ydan entered the world as a fighting champion. From birth, he faced several complex medical conditions that would require great strength — of mind, body, and spirit — to overcome. He was born with just one kidney, an enlarged heart, and extensive swelling in his tissue and organs.

At three years old and weighing only 35 pounds, Aydan suffered both heart failure and a stroke that paralyzed his right arm and leg. He was placed on a heart/lung machine (ECMO) and endured intense rehabilitation over several months at Atrium Health Levine Children's Hospital.

Aydan was placed on the heart transplant list and spent five months at Levine Children's Hospital. His heart couldn't pump enough blood, so he was supported by a Berlin Heart, an external artificial heart that allowed him to stay active while waiting for his transplant.

Even during his most challenging times, Aydan's bright smile, charm, and wit captured the hearts of his care team and fellow patients. He'd often be seen striking a Spider Man pose, living every day with joy and lifting the spirits of patients and families.

A Second Chance, A New Heart

Just one month before Aydan's fourth birthday, his mother, Miriam, received the greatest news of their lives: there was a heart available, and Aydan was a perfect match. Aydan received his new heart thanks to another family's heartbreaking and generous decision to choose organ donation and give the gift of life. Following the surgery, Aydan was asked what he thought his heart did, and he responded with one word: "Love."

Aydan's heart surgeon, Dr. Thomas Maxey, marvels at Aydan's growth over the past eight years. " 'Warrior' is an understatement for Aydan," he said. "He has a glowing personality, spunk, grit, and a passion for life."

A Champion for Children

Now 12 years old, Aydan is thriving. From playing the trombone and video games, to enjoying "all types" of candy, his enthusiasm for life abounds. Always full of love for his fellow heart warriors and other patients at Levine Children's Hospital, Aydan has embarked on a new journey: serving as the 2025 Children's Miracle Network Champion for the Charlotte area, an honor that recognizes his greatest qualities.

CMN Impact:

The first ECMO machine at Levine Children's Hospital was purchased with Children's Miracle Network (CMN) funds. These unrestricted funds allow hospital leadership to purchase what is needed, when it is needed. ECMO is a type of life support that keeps blood moving through the body and blood gases in balance. It serves as temporary heart and lungs, allowing a patient's organs to rest. CMN has since funded additional ECMO machines used throughout Atrium Health Levine Children's care locations, saving the lives of our most critical pediatric patients.




Edmund Hill SHEA III

AN ANGEL ON EARTH BRINGS HOPE TO LEVINE CHILDREN'S

any faith traditions believe that angels walk among us, bringing peace and comfort to the living.

Benjamin Robert Poole — described by his family as one such angel on earth — inspired his parents, Molly and Zach, to find a cure for medulloblastoma after he lost his life to the disease at



age three. Through the Benjamin the Brave Medulloblastoma Foundation, the Pooles are helping families facing this common childhood brain cancer.

The Poole family, through Benjamin the Brave Medulloblastoma Foundation, has made their second and largest gift to Atrium Health Foundation in support of Atrium Health Levine Children's. This recent donation will help fund the collection of tumor samples from five patients, advancing research and improving treatment options for children with medulloblastoma.

Additionally, the gift will ease the financial burden on families whose children undergo proton beam therapy at Atrium Health Levine Cancer Proton & Advanced Radiation Center. Although this cutting-edge treatment was not

available in Charlotte while Benjamin was alive, children and adults in the region can now benefit from this life-saving therapy, close to home.

Finding the lessons in life and loss

Benjamin was diagnosed in 2019, shortly after his second birthday, and he and his family traveled across the country in search of a cure. Although he endured rigorous treatments and multiple brain surgeries, Benjamin's joyful spirit prevailed and inspired. During treatments, he'd sing and dance to his favorite songs. After his hair fell out, what remained formed a perfect halo pattern on top of his head. And in his last weeks, his family shared that he'd point to the sky in his sleep, an angelic picture of hope amidst incredible pain.

The mission of Benjamin the Brave underscores the importance of not only seeking a cure for medulloblastoma but also supporting families amidst their cancer journey — a goal that has carried the Poole family forward and continues to bring hope to countless patients at Levine Children's Hospital.







Easing the burdens of care

While research is essential to improving future outcomes for medulloblastoma patients, there is much to be done to support patients who are currently undergoing treatment. With the opening of the Atrium Health Levine Cancer Advanced Proton & Radiation Center, it is expected that this facility will care for between 10-15 pediatric medulloblastoma patients in the coming year. Many of these patients will travel to Charlotte from other locations during a six-week course of treatment, costing each family an average of \$7,500 to cover lodging, transportation, and associated costs of living, all while navigating daily proton beam therapy. The Benjamin the Brave Medulloblastoma Foundation will significantly reduce the financial burden for families undergoing this novel care, a key component of the organization's mission to support families in their battles with this disease.



IN MEMORIAM

Elinor CADDELL

December 5, 1922 - September 4, 2024

Elinor Caddell graduated from the inaugural class of Charlotte Memorial Hospital School of Nursing in 1944. She began her career at Charlotte Memorial Hospital, where she also



mentored nursing students. Recognizing her passion for nursing education, she earned a bachelor's degree in nursing education from Duke University and returned to Charlotte in 1948 to teach at Charlotte Memorial Hospital. In 1960, she went back to Duke to complete a master's degree and to teach. By 1965, Elinor was in Charlotte again, this time to help establish the nursing program at UNC Charlotte. She played a pivotal role in introducing graduate nursing education to UNC Charlotte in the late 1980s, marking the culmination of her distinguished career.

Regarded as a North Carolina treasure, Elinor touched all levels of nursing education throughout the state, shaping the careers of thousands of nurses and, through them, impacting the lives of countless patients. Every person who knew Elinor — from her former students to fellow alumni, colleagues, and friends — knew her passion for education and her dedication to patient-centered care, including patients' physical, emotional, and spiritual needs.

During her lifetime, Elinor was a generous donor to the Carolinas College of Health Sciences

(CCHS). A scholarship was established in her name by former classmates and students to benefit associate degree nursing students pursuing higher education. Her generous designation of CCHS as a beneficiary of her estate will further develop numerous educational opportunities for faculty, alumni, and students.

Elinor's legacy will continue to inspire all who had the privilege of knowing her — and will ensure that her spirit lives on in the hearts and minds of those she touched.



Kicks for Kids scores big for Levine Children's patients



Plants seeds of hope for the next generation

lanned gifts are essential to sustaining Atrium Health's mission, enabling us to invest in the future of health care. A legacy gift from Veronica Gelardi will support the pediatric nephrology program at Atrium Health Levine Children's, where her grandson receives care. Her heartfelt gift is impacting her family as well as the lives of countless children and families affected by kidney disease.

A California native, Veronica was known for her deep devotion to her family, including caring for her eldest child who lived with a life-changing disability. In 2017, Veronica settled in Charlotte, North Carolina, to be near her son Nick Foy and his wife, Natalie, and their two children.

Nick and Natalie's oldest child, Theo, was diagnosed in utero with severe kidney complications. He spent the first three months of his life in critical care at Atrium Health Levine Children's Hospital. When he was 17 months old, he underwent a life-saving kidney transplant, thanks to a generous donor — his aunt. In the years that followed, Veronica witnessed the dedication of Theo's care team at Levine Children's Hospital, led by his devoted nephrologist, Dr. Susan Massengill.





Theo's life will forever be linked to Levine Children's nephrology program — a fact that his grandmother knew well. Though a cure for kidney disease remains elusive, Theo and his fellow patients face their lifelong health conditions with an outstanding support system at Levine Children's. "Theo isn't defined by his illness at all," said Dr. Massengill. "And that's the win, that's the triumph."

Thanks to the support of philanthropy and donors like Veronica, Theo and fellow "kidney kids" continue to benefit from the region's most comprehensive nephrology program which features a psychologist and other services to address the mental and emotional needs of children diagnosed with lifelong kidney disease.

The program also offers Co-Production, a peer support group and collaboration between patients, families, and medical providers, giving children with kidney disease a safe space to share their anxieties, support one another, and co-develop tools such as new patient welcome kits.

Veronica's planned gift supports Levine Children's Hospital's evolution as a nationally respected center of excellence in nephrology. "Our hope is to become a destination for kids to come and get the treatment they need, and we continue to expand on what we can do with the support of philanthropy," said Dr. Massengill.

The Levine Children's nephrology team charts a path to hope

- A study led by Levine Children's nephrologist Dr. Donald "Jack" Weaver is currently focused on cardiovascular outcomes of kidney disease and developing ways to mitigate cardiovascular impact for patients at a younger age.
- Dr. Megan Yanik leads a transplant consortium that aims to establish protocols and best practices in addressing medication compliance among children and adolescents with kidney disease — a vital aspect of survival, post-transplant.
- Dr. Massengill and her colleagues are paving the way for the development of novel therapies to better target and individualize care, including a national clinical trial called the NEPTUNE study, which has been funded by the National Institutes for Health.

When it came time for Nick to discuss his mother's estate plans with her, it was clear that supporting the nephrology program at Levine Children's would be especially meaningful to Veronica. Nick, who is a financial advisor and founder of Greenway Wealth Advisors, discussed options with his mother and determined the best choice to achieve her vision was to name Atrium Health Foundation as the beneficiary of Veronica's IRA, to benefit Levine Children's Hospital's pediatric nephrology program. It was also meaningful for Veronica to personally express her gratitude for Dr. Massengill, whom she deeply admired for her devotion to Theo.

"There's nobody as passionate about what they do as Dr. Massengill," shared Nick. "It's important to us, as it was to my mother, to enable future generations of kids who need high-quality care to access it easily. To see the way the program has evolved and grown over the years is significant."

Moved by Veronica's final act of generosity, Dr. Massengill shared, "I'm honored that she would trust me — and trust our team — to take this gift and help others the way we've been able to help Theo. I'm very grateful and touched."
